While in Rarotonga, Ms. Ragan-Anunsen befriended a Rarotongian dog named "Honey" and learned that there were no veterinary services in the country for its *thousands of cats and dogs. (*According to the local anti-cruelty group **representative** in 1993, there were "6,000 dogs and 8,000 cats" on Rarotonga.) Ragan-Anunsen returned to her home in Oregon and, with the help of her colleagues, friends and family, began to assemble the necessary components to establish the Cook Islands' only veterinary hospital - www.estherhoney.org
